

## June / July 2006 "F Y I" Update

The ONG general membership meeting was held on June 21 at noon hour in the Conference Centre of the Ottawa Citizen. President Lois Kirkup reported on local and executive activity since the last membership meeting, and Treasurer Gord Holder presented the financial report to May 31, 2006. The fall general membership meeting is planned for 12 noon on Wednesday, September 13 in the Citizen Conference Centre.
The June meeting of the executive committee was held in the Guild office on June 21 and was attended by Lois Kirkup, Janet Hunter, Nancy Noel, Gord Holder, Joanne Schnurr, Marc Laurin, Tony Cote, Terry Garner, Claude L'Ecuyer and Don Smith. Debbie Cole and Jordan Juby did not attend. The July executive meeting was cancelled and the next regular meeting of the executive committee will be held on August 15.
Grievance update: • The Citizen/RS&S discipline letter grievance is proceeding to standing committee and the Guild is working on revisions to the letter. • The grievance filed by the Guild concerning no posting of the Good Morning Canada host position by CTV Ottawa (CJOH) remains unresolved. The company is maintaining its stand that the GMC host job is an assignment and not a position, and the CJOH unit members want to proceed to arbitration on the grievance. This could be an issue to be addressed at the next round of contract bargaining. The current collective agreement ends December 31.
A joint meeting of the ONG and Citizen Pay Equity Review committee members, along with the provincial review officer, was held on June 22. The joint committees will meet again with the review officer on September 22.
In early June, TNG Canada staff rep David Wilson and DLR unit leader Marc Laurin met with the company and received updated contract revisions proposed by the company. The Guild executive committee discussed the contract proposals extensively at its June meeting and expressed concern at the many new issues introduced at this stage of bargaining. The Guild executive continues to stress the importance of not removing or weakening contract clauses that are currently in place to protect the members. A meeting with DLR has been arranged for mid-August with Lois Kirkup, Claude L'Ecuyer, Marc Laurin and Dave Wilson attending for the Guild.
The Guild executive committee has recently contracted the work for the development of a website for the Ottawa Newspaper Guild. The plan is to have the website in operation by this fall.
Lois Kirkup and Tony Cote attended the TNG Sector Conference July 7-8 and the CWA Convention July 10-11 in Las Vegas as ONG delegates. At the TNG conference, Lois Kirkup was elected to the position of Canada East Vice-President for TNG Canada/CWA. TNG Canada issued a July 17 news release outlining the new Canadian Region agreement reached with CWA. The agreement is subject to ratification by Canadian members. This annual event brings together experts on the field of demographics to discuss the problems of aging societies. Fifteen journalists have been invited to take part in this year's event and Pauline is only the third Canadian journalist selected to participate in the program since its inception in 1999. Pauline will learn about population aging and longevity for an upcoming special project she is working on to be published in the Citizen in the coming months.
